## Second Quarter Highlight: Responding to Hurricanes Helene and Milton

At the end of September, Southwest Florida was impacted by Hurricane Helene, which was followed shortly by Hurricane Milton in early October. Staff in the region, including Ayers-Rigsby and De La Torre Salas are continuing to work with partners in the region including local governments, state parks, aquatic preserves, and others to document impacts to the archaeological sites, including serious impacts to state parks.

FPAN staff continue to work closely with local community representatives and resource managers to document the impacts to these sites.
