

First Quarter Highlight:
Improving Florida's
Resiliency and Assisting
Local Governments at the
National Alliance for
Preservation Commissions
Annual Conference

In August, FPAN SE staff assisted with the National Alliance for Preservation Commissions annual FORUM conference. This conference attracts historic preservation professionals from across the country. Sara Ayers-Rigsby served on the conference planning committee for the event.

Ayers-Rigsby worked with the City of Fort Lauderdale Historic Preservation Office to lead a water taxi tour of the riverfront area. Fenn partnered with the City of West Palm Beach to lead a cemetery bus tour of the site. Ayers-Rigsby and Fenn were joined by FPAN staff for other regions for a session on Climate Change and Vulnerability

Second Quarter Highlight: Kayak Tour to Indian Key State Park

In December, FPAN staff partnered with Islamorada Area State Parks for a kayak tour to Indian Key State Park. This site is accessible only via water. Participants learned about the history and use of the site, as well as about the maritime heritage of the area. Participants in the tour traveled from Stuart and Miami to participate in the tour. Staff from NOAA also collaborated to make the tour a success.

Third Quarter Highlight: Archaeobootcamp and Field School Graduation

In March, FPAN completed its eighth annual Archaeobootcamp. This free three-day program invites students from across the country to learn the basics of archaeology including survey, excavation, artifact identification, ground penetrating radar, photogrammetry, and public outreach and archaeology. Students this year came from FAU, USF, UCF, and FSU. This program is a collaboration between the Florida Public Archaeology Network and the Bureau of Land Management. FPAN SE staff were joined by FPAN from across the state including Executive Director, Dr. Mary Minkoff, who presented on ceramics during the Saturday public day.

Fourth Quarter Highlight: Field School Graduation

In April, FPAN completed its third annual field school. This program is certified by the Register of Professional Archaeologists as an introductory level field school. This program is a collaboration between the Florida Public Archaeology Network, Florida Atlantic University, and the Bureau of Land Management. The program is funded through an award agreement with the Bureau of Land Management. Fourteen students completed the program this year and represented undergraduate and graduate students from Florida Atlantic University. Undergraduate students from other schools in Florida, like UCF and FlU, also completed the program.

Other Highlights

 Fenn and Candia partered with Broward College to update their archaeology exhibit. As part of this process, Fenn and Candia also scheduled an archaeology careers panel for undergraduate students at Broward College and FAU featuring speakers from the City of Fort Lauderdale and History Fort Lauderdale.
