Second Quarter Hightlight: Honrando Nuestra Historia

In September and October, FPAN SW led by De La Torre Salas worked to lead a statewide series of events recognizing Latine culture across Florida. This series, Honrando Nuestra Historia, takes place in collaboration with heritage organizations across the state including the Cape Coral Museum of History, the Clewiston History Museum, the Bonita Springs Historical Society, Collier County Museums, Mound House, the Randell Research Center at Pineland Florida Museum of Natural History, the Marco Island Historical Society, and the Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge System. Over 400 partipants came to the event held with with Ding Darling at Lakes Park.

Third Quarter Hightlight: CRPT with Immokalee Interact Club

In February, FPAN SW led by De La Torre Salas and assisted by Malachi Fenn (FPAN SE), Sara Ayers-Rigsby, Rachael Kangas, and Michaela Candia, partnered with the Imokalee Pioneer Museum to lead a Cemetery Resource Protection Training (CRPT) for the Interact Club from the Immokalee High School. 20 students and teachers met in the museum to learn about historic preservation and cemetery management from FPAN staff before going into the field to clean headstones and collect trash at the Jane Brown Grave Site. FPAN staff hope to continue this collaboration with the Interact Club in 2025!
